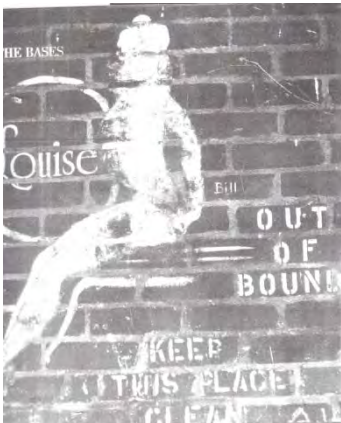

Unlucky Bastards

This year is the 150th Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg. It is remembered as a great battle but more importantly as part of a great struggle that threatened our country. But

for the sacrifice of so many of them, we would not have this great country of ours today.

Last year the 388th Memorial Rededication Ceremony at Knettishall remembered the special sacrifice of our own. The ceremony was highlighted by the official unveiling of two stones listing the members of the 388th that died during WWII. I was honored to give my remarks on the occasion and chose to read the Gettysburg address. In a way that memorial honors those heroes just as the National Cemetery at Gettysburg honors their forbearers.

The young men of the 388th who died must have studied the Gettysburg Address just a few years earlier in high school. Many of them would have even memorized and recited it in front of their class. Little did they know then that soon they would earn those words of eternal gratitude and honor.

Just like the men who died on Little Round Top, these men did not ask for their lives to be disrupted nor did they wish to learn to wage war. But when the emergency came and their country called, they did their duty and joined the ranks of the brave. In England, they faced the danger along with their comrades not knowing who would become a Lucky Bastard and who would not. In the end they never received their certificate.

YOU'LL NEVER LOOK AT THIS GAME IN THE SAME WAY AGAIN!



Starting in 1941, an increasing number of British Airmen found themselves as the involuntary guests of the Third Reich, and the Crown was casting about for ways and means to facilitate their escape.

Now obviously, one of the most helpful aids to that end is a useful and accurate map, one showing not only where stuff was, but also showing the locations of 'safe houses' where a POW on-the-lam could go for food and shelter.

Paper maps had some real drawbacks...they make a lot of noise when you open and fold them, they wear out rapidly, and if they get wet, they turn to mush.

Someone in MI-5 (similar to America's OSS) got the idea of printing escape maps on silk. It's durable, can be scrunched-up into tiny wads, and unfolded as many times as needed, and makes no noise whatsoever.

At that time, there was only one manufacturer in Great Britain that had perfected the technology of printing on silk, and that was John Waddington, Ltd. When approached by the government, the firm was only too happy to do its bit for the war effort.

By pure coincidence, Waddington was also the U.K. Licensee for the popular American board game, Monopoly. As it happened, 'games and pastimes' was a category of item qualified for insertion into 'CARE packages', dispatched by the International Red Cross to prisoners of war.

Under the strictest of secrecy, in a securely guarded and inaccessible old workshop on the grounds of Waddington's, a group of sworn-to-secrecy employees began mass-producing

escape maps, keyed to each region of Germany or Italy where Allied POW camps were. When processed, these maps could be folded into such tiny dots that they would actually fit inside a Monopoly playing piece.

As long as they were at it, the clever workmen at Waddington's also managed to add:

- 1) A playing token that contained a small magnetic compass
- 2) A two-part metal file that could easily be screwed together
- 3) Useful amounts of genuine high-denomination German, Italian, and French currency, hidden within the piles of Monopoly money!

British and American air crews were advised, before taking off on their first mission, how to identify a 'rigged' Monopoly set...by means of a tiny red dot, one cleverly rigged to look like an ordinary printing glitch, located in the corner of the Free Parking square.

Of the estimated 35,000 Allied POWS who successfully escaped, an estimated one-third were aided in their flight by the rigged Monopoly sets. Everyone who did so was sworn to secrecy indefinitely, since the British Government might want to use this highly successful ruse in still another war.

The story wasn't declassified until 2007, when the surviving craftsmen from Waddington's, as well as the firm itself, were finally honored in a public ceremony.

It's always nice when you can play that 'Get Out of Jail Free' card!

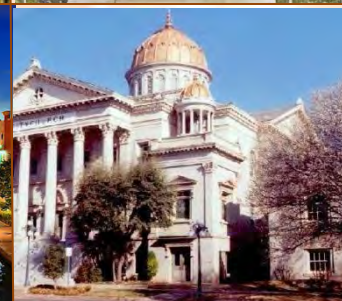

the passing yesterday, 30 Jan 2013, of Ed Rasimus, a remarkable Vietnam era pilot who flew 250 combat missions in two tours of duty in Southeast Asia, both with the 388th Tactical Fighter

Wing, from Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base in Thailand. He was born in the same year as the 388th Bomb Group.

Ed was perhaps first featured in the public eye in a 1966 USAF documentary titled "There Is A Way." He was one of a number of F-105 Thunderchief pilots interviewed about their perspectives on the air war in Vietnam. His sense of humor and wit was notable even then.

BYRON L. BLAND

Byron Lanier Bland, 88, of Georgetown, GA, died January 10. Bombardier on the Billy K. Faurot crew in the 560th Sqd., he flew 13 missions between March and April 1945, and participated in one of the May 1945 Operation Chowhound missions. He was discharged from the service on his 21st birthday.

Mr. Bland received a BS in Agricultural Engineering in 1949 and, after a year of graduate study and teaching, returned with his wife and family to Eufaula, where he had lived as a child. There he partnered with his brother in Bland & Sons, an agricultural supply company started by their father. He raised Black Angus cattle, grew peanuts and corn, and provided local farmers with custom hay baling and combining.

Affiliations included the Georgia Farm Bureau, National and Barbour County Wild Turkey Federation, and Pataula E.M.C. A member of the First Presbyterian Church of Eufaula for more than 65 years, and served his church in many capacities including Deacon, Elder, and Superintendent of the Sunday School.

Survivors include Bettie, Mr. Bland's wife of 67 years; sons Byron II and James; five grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Funeral services were held January 12 at the First Presbyterian Church of Eufaula.

JACK M. CLEMER

Jack M. Clemer, former parliamentarian of the 388th BG Assn., died January 23 in Kerrville, TX at age 90.

Mr. Clemer served as tail gunner on the David Thayer crew in the 561st Sqd., flying 30 missions between April and July 1944. Awards included the DFC, Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters, Silver Star and three Battle Stars.

After receiving his law degree from the University of Texas, Mr. Clemer was admitted to the Texas Bar in 1947. He practiced law for 38 years in Houston, Corpus Christi, and Robstown, TX before retiring to Kerrville. He was city judge in Robstown from 1964 until 1980.

He was a founder of Robstown Community Action and served as a director of the Robstown Chamber of Commerce. He was vice president of the Corpus Christi Jaycees while living in Corpus Christi and served as a director of the Robert Moore Community Center in Corpus Christi. He also served as a director of the Robstown Industrial Foundation, as a board

member of the Nueces County Unit of the American Cancer Society and was a sustaining member of the Boy Scouts of America. Long active in Democratic Party affairs, he had served as a precinct chairman and as a delegate to the State Democratic Convention. He was a member of the United Methodist Church and had served as a trustee and steward of the First United Methodist Church of Robstown. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the University of Texas Ex-Students Association.

Survivors Karen Sue Woodall, his partner in life; sons Michael and Mark; and four grandchildren. Mr. Clemer was preceded in death by his wife, Peggy.

Memorial services were held at Mr. Clemer's ranch in Kerrville.

JOHN W. DIXON

John Walton Dixon passed away November 4, 2012 at Hilton Head Island, SC. He was 91. While at Knettishall, he was a 1st Lieutenant assigned to 388th BG headquarters.

Mr. Dixon received an AB from Harvard College in 1943, and an MBA from Columbia University in 1948. As a CPA, he worked at Price Waterhouse in Boston before joining Loomis Sayles Co., Inc. (also of Boston), from which he retired in 1983. He and his wife Dori moved to Hilton Head in 1982.

His many affiliations included the Magna Charta Barons, Massachusetts Mayflower Society, Sons of the American Revolution, National Society of Sons and Daughters of the Pilgrims, and the Harvard Society. He served as treasurer of the Dedham, Massachusetts Historical Society and as treasurer of the General Theological Library.

Mr. Dixon is survived by Dori, his wife of 64 years. The couple lost their son, Richard, in 1966. A memorial service was held at St. Luke's Church, Hilton Head.

ALVIN L. FEHRMAN

Alvin Lione Fehrman (Lt. Col. Ret.) died in Bluffton, SC on January 22 at age 88. A pilot in the 563rd Sqd., he flew 22 missions before his aircraft was downed over Oranienburg, Germany on March 15, 1945. Awards included the Air Medal with 2 Oak Leaf Clusters, a Purple Heart, and two Bronze Stars for the Ardennes and Rhineland Campaigns.

He received BS in Engineering from Vanderbilt University; an MS in Aeronautics and an advanced degree in Aeronautical Engineering from the California Institute of Technology; and a MS in

Private services with full military honors were held at Barrancas National Cemetery in Pensacola, FL.

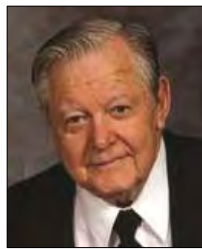
WALTER KIRBY, JR.

GEORGE E. KISTNER

George Ernest Kistner, Sr., 90, passed away March 5 at The Villages, FL. Prior to moving to the retirement community in 1994, he and his wife Irene had resided in Lake Ariel, PA.

A radio operator in the 561st Sqd., Mr. Kistner flew 29 missions between April 1944 and January 1945, primarily with pilots Eugene Fowler and Lawrence Locker. "Time on My Hands," a memoir of his experiences, was published in *The 388th Anthology, Vol. II*. Awards included the Air Medal with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters.

For 33 years, Mr. Kistner was a Fourdrinier wire weaver at Eastwood-Nealy Corp. in Belleville, NJ. Affiliations included the Masonic Lodge, Tri-county High 12 Club #674, and the Order of the Arrow, the national honor society of the Boy Scouts of America. He was also a charter member of St. George Episcopal Church.

Survivors include his wife Irene, whom he met and courted in England in 1944; daughter Janet Gottheiner; sons George Jr. and James; eight grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Interment with military honors was held at Bushnell National Cemetery.

DOUGLAS G. MCARTHUR

Douglas G. McArthur died February 14, 2012 in Longview, WA at age 94. A pilot in the 561st Sqd., he flew 38 missions between April and August 1944.

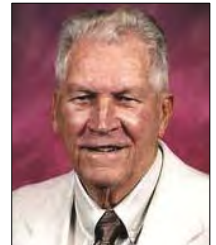
JOSEPH F. PATTERSON
